#### GENERAL EDUCATION PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITY (GEPLC) UPDATES

Dr. Leanne Merrill has been elected the Chair of the 2020-21 GEPLC. Dr. Merrill has prior experience on assessment Professional Learning Communities. Her instruction in First Year Seminars also provides her with valuable perspective on streamlining the submission process for work samples.

The (GEPLC) is a crucial element of the General Education assessment plan. The faculty who come together in the GEPLC play an important role in our mission. General Education provides a shared framework for nearly all WOU undergraduate students, regardless of major. We want to understand the program as a whole and to help students find meaning and purpose in their work. Since the General Education program contains shared learning outcomes for all disciplines, the GEPLC works to build a mutual understanding of how these learning outcomes are assessed in a variety of contexts. We also need to evolve to address our learning outcomes and to refine those outcomes if we discover the need. Finally, as a truly interdisciplinary program, we must come together to support innovation and collaboration and to understand this program to which we all contribute and in which all of our students are engaged.

### In 2019-20, the GEPLC identified General Education Learning Outcome (GELO) 1:

Foundational Skills and Breadth of Knowledge as our GELO of interest and chose to explore the alignment of First Year Seminars to GELO 1. An outcome of our work was a complete revision and overhaul of the Foundational Skills rubric. This revised rubric


- Emphasizes a multidisciplinary approach to emphasize
- Relies on backward design so that students and faculty can work toward capstone proficiency.
- Features aspirational language that identifies what students can do rather than deficiency language that identifies what students may be missing.

In 2020-21, the GEPLC will be using work samples collected last year and this year to norm and further refine this rubric and to establish our rubric targets for First Year Seminars. We also plan to use the successful revision process to craft a rubric aligned to an additional GELO.

## GENERAL EDUCATION BY THE NUMBERS: FALL TERM PETITIONS

In Fall 2020, the General Education office processed 208 petition requests for waivers, substitutions or other exceptions to General Education requirements.



This represents a decrease of about 34% from the 317 petitions processed in Spring 2020.

Of these 23 (11%) were declined. The majority of declined petitions were requests to use WOI

Of these, 23 (11%) were declined. The majority of declined petitions were requests to use WOU courses not approved by the General Education Committee to meet General Education requirements.

We assisted 6 students impacted by the Concordia shutdown.

We processed 44 transfer courses through the Transfer Evaluation System to articulate either as existing WOU courses or as electives that meet General Education requirements.

We also worked with the registrar's office to review 4 student transcripts with 11 Joint Military Service courses for alignment to General Education requirements.

Faculty Senate has just voted to affirm the recommendation of the General Education Committee to allow students with one course or requirement remaining in an AAOT or other approved transfer degree to complete the credential at WOU to meet their General Education requirements. Students can use the transfer degree option in the petition form to make this request.
